#### **President's Message**

For the rest of us, it was a great opportunity to walk in to the Cossar Cabin and enjoy some socializing. We estimate 52 people turned up to enjoy and support the event and it is most heartening to the organizers to see this kind of response in such poor skiing conditions. Our thanks to all who came out and special thanks to the organizers, Peter and Henny Tiesma, Conrad and Shirley Hill, Kurt and Anna Olsen, and Dave and Irene Kirk.

Unfortunately our Moonlight Ski was not held due to lack of snow. This event is usually a highlight for those who attend and I know they were disappointed to miss out this year.

Trail grooming is in effect now that some snow is evident. We try to get out after each snowfall to pack and groom the trails and thus help retain the snow for a longer period of time and to smooth out some of the bumps. Given enough time, we lay down tracks for skiing but unfortunately we can't track all of the trails, so you will sometimes come across packed trail that has to have the tracks skied in. At this time we do not have enough equipment to enable us to track all of the trails. The grooming is done using snowmobiles to pull the equipment and on occasion we've had the odd frown from skiers seeing the snowmobile on their cross-country ski trail. We try to have the grooming done prior to the weekend, but if you do see us out there you know we belong.

Our sweat shirt and toque sales are going well. They seem to be a popular item with our members. Don't forget if you are in at the Cossar Cabin on the weekends, ask our Cabin Keeper to show them to you. The sweater sells for \$30 and the toque for \$15, I think you'll be impressed with the style and colour of both.

We also have some used ski equipment for sale at the Cossar Cabin. It is on the left side as you enter the west end door. The price is marked on each piece of equipment and the transaction is based on your honour. Simply mark one of the parking lot envelopes with "Ski Equipment" and put the money inside and deposit the sealed envelope in the money box in the parking lot, or give it to the Cabin Keeper.

Please, when you visit our cabins, consider your entry fee to be one armload of wood, deposited under the benches for future burning. This applies to all of our cabins on the trail system. Thanks.
